"MATTHEW GELARDI, SCIENTIST, DIES"

Electronics Scientist, Matth**ew** Gelardi, an employee of the Control and Guidance division, AEEL, died unespectedly, Tuesday, February 4th. (1958) He was 53

A native of Boston, Massachuetts, Mr. Gelardi first came to the Philadelphia area in September 1942, while on active Navy duty. After a year at the Naval Aircraft Factory and 2½ years at NAMC, he was transferred to the Naval Aircraft Modification Unit, Johnsville, as leading Chief (Radar/Radio) in July 1944.2017339

He remained in this capacity until his discharge in early 1947. He liked the area so well that he returned shortly after his discharge in a civilian capacity, accepting a temporary appointment as a Laboratory Mechanic on January 20, 1947.

Some six months later, Mr. Gelardi was given a probationary appointment as an Electronics Engineer in the Electronics Section, Pilotless Aircraft Division.

On February 4, 1948 (Ed. note: exactly 10 years before his demise) he shifted from the Pilotless Aircraft Development Lab. to AEEL, where he has been since with the exception of the period from October 5, 1950 to March 3D, 1952, when he was recalled to active duty.

Before being called to active service in May, 1941, Mr. Gelardi was employed for 7½ yrs as a Radio and Sound Engenieer, and 8½ years prior to that as a test engineer, all in the Boston area. The Park Title . JOHE - S. 68

He was a member of the Institute of Radio Engineers and the American Radio Relay League: Relay League

Mr. Gelardi lived at 2606 Horsham Road, Hatboro, Pa.

"limited" member is one who for any reason cannot do so but nevertheless is in support of the group and will be available as his personal circumstances permit. Thus, there is a provision in the AREC for every amateur licensee.

RED CROSS DISASTER DEMONSTRATION FOLLOWED BY REAL THING AND DESIGN CONSTRAINED

On Tuesday, March 17, 1964, at approximately 4:30 P.M., at 22nd and Montgumary (4) Avenue, the Central Philadelphia Branch of the Southeastern Pannsylvania or againstic Chapter of the American Red Cross had just emerged from a demonstration of according Disaster Shelter when they were greeted by an earshattering noise. Looking up they saw a car rolling side over side, down the street towards them. Behind the car a bus was careening, out of control, hitting four other cars along the way.


