

Kudos for Ernie, Joe and Ozzie for a job well done as our contest committee. With more that 90% club participation, win or lose, the Pack Rats did a commendable job. Our heartfelt thanks to our Editor, Helen Brick, who besides having "Cheese Bits" out on time, with a fine edition, also handled all the paper work for the contest committee.

For those interested in mobile work, particularly low battery drain and transistor transmitters, there is a new tube on the market that is similar to the 6146 power pentode that does not draw heater voltage in standby condi-. tion. It is a 4606 tube that has a unique oxide-coated filament that heats up in one second. The filament draws 0.64 ampere at 6.3 volts and can deliver 30 watts output to 175 mc.

The IRE bulletin answers some questions the answer sometimes may depend on whether you are an optimist or a pessimist. For benefit of those readers of the latter persuasion, there is listed below a few definitions pertaining to the audio field.

Audio Amplifier- A device for adding distortion to an ausio signal. Compliance- The result of weak resistance.

FM- A system for listening to a phonograph played at a remote location. High Fi- High finance or what a sales dept recently discoverd in equipment you have been making all these years. Stero- A more expensive phonograph for playing more expensive stero records through more loudspeakers.

High Fidelity- A phonograph; also see FM.

Super Fi- Your system, as compared to the one your friends own.

Ultra Fi- What your friend thinks of his system, compared to yours.

High Fi Record- Any phonograph record pressed later than the year 1926.

Loudspeaker- A transducer for converting electrical energy into noise energy.

Program Equalizer- Means for modifying e program according to judgement of the music director.

Tone Control- Means for modifying or neutralizing the judgement of the music director.

Flat Response- Characteristic of an audio component which tends to flatten the pocketbook.

### FROM THE MAILBAG

We received the following letter from the VHF Editor of CQ Magazine and also the "VHF Amateur", Bob Brown, K2ZSQ.

\*\*\*\*

You can't imagine how many times I've started to write you re: "Cheese Bits" but you what deadline are...and they have to be met. Just never seem to have the time to do all that has to be done.

First off, I'd like to compliment you and the staff at "Cheese Bits" for a really excellent job! We look forward

to every issue anxiously to read all about the Mt. Airy V.H.F. Radio Club's activities and members contributions to the paper. It is one of the few publications that we read in its entirety. As you might suspect, we get well over 40 magazines, papers, club bulletins, etc., every month and have quite a bit to mull over, but "Cheese Bits" is the one we read first, mainly because its the best we've seen yet. I honestly don't see how you get so much news and articles each month! (If there's some secret formula to it, Please pass it along - I need it - I'll keep it in strictest confidence!)

Doing the CQ column is really a lot of fun - keeps me well informed on v.h.f. activities the world over. Time is getting to be a real scarce commodity, though. Our Century Club Award applications come streaming in each day, along with letters upon letters for publication along with TVI info requests, and the really big one coming up, logs for the February 1961 CQ World Wide V.H.F. Contest. The letters,as such, though, seemed to have slacked off this month. Letters. the essential backing of work like this, arrive very sporadically... Sometimes we get bundles, other times (like the last four weeks) they come in one at a time, once a week. But in every case, the deadline must be met. All in a day's work - hi!

Dur other endeavor, THE VHF AMATEUR is working out very well. As you might remember, we started as you are doing - a club bulletin. ("QSO"). But more recently its come along to the point where we're able to fill 24 pages (28 next month) and get 2,000 copies out every month to readers. We are printing by the photo offset method, which means that every page is typewritten (on a VariTyper), heading inserted by pastming to the page, photographed just as at a camera store, and put on a sheet to be run through the presses. After that 12,000 individual sheets have to be collated, stapled, addressed and stamped, by hand, and finally mailed to subscribers. We hope that someday we'll be able to afford to have the entire job done by some outside publishing concern. Once a month, the whole house is in an uproar, with everyone pitching in to get the mess out in the mails before company drops in - hi!

Well, enough of my troubles. Would like to mention to your many readers that we'll be looking for them on 6 and 2 meters here from Rahway at the low end. Antenna for 6 is an 11 element Telrex, while on 2 we're working on a quad. Power is 100 watts. 
