In the single-operator category the leader was W3TXY, (they pulled the Booboo, not me. Should read TYX. Heh, heh!) Philadelphia, who won the Eastern Pa. Section, working 332 stations on 50 and 144 Mc for 18,042 points. W2BLV Haddonfield, New Jersey, Southern New Jersey winner, also worked 332 stations, but with a lower section multiplier came up with 17,264 points. George worked 50, 144 and 432 Mc. The greatest number of contacts by a single operator was 404, the work of W3HYJ. Catching only 10 sections dropped him back to the No. 3 spot in the country.

Best contect total on 144 Mc. was 236 stations, by $$ \pm 318 H$, Philadelphia. Charlie's section total was $1 c \omega$, so he only had 8024 points to show for this effort --7 sections.

The Mt. Airy V.H.F. Club of Philadelphia moved up two notches, to third place, dropping the Midwest V.H.F. Club from second to fourth.

TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS

The 2540 mile path from Southern California to Hawaii has been covered on 222 Mc. KH6UK and W6NLZ, who made the historic breakthrough over this same path on 144 Mc in 1957, contacted each other on 222 Mc at 1930 Hawaiian time June 22. Signals reached S7 during the 53 minute contact. A second vhf record was set on 1215 Mo by W6DQJ /6 and K6AXN/6 during the June ARRL VHF Party, when these stations worked from Mt. Abel to Baid Rock, California, a distance of 400 miles. Details on both vhf records will appear in August QST.

TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT.

Amateurs using 144 Mc should watch for chances to work long distances via sporadic E skip in July. Ionization density in the E region of the ionosphere has reached very high levels recently, and 144 Mc has been open for skip distances of 1100 to 1400 miles. Contacts were made betwenn England and Itlay June 15. On June 17 Toronto area stations and W2DRI workied W5YYO and W5MJD, near Amarillo. W4GJO, Sarasota, Fla., worked W5SFW, Amarillo, June 28. Three VE3's worked W5SFW July 4. W4LTU, Springfield, Va. received test transmissions from WØIC, Denver during the same opening. Verv short skip on 50 Mc near the midpoint of an anticipated 144 Mc path is a good indication that the higher frequency may be open. Please report any unusual DX heard or worked to ARRL.

REPORT FROM ANOTHER ROVING "PACK RAT"

Dear Frankie:

As I promosed, here is news item:

On recent visit to Los Angeles, had a visit with W6ZL, Don Lusk (formerly W3ZL of Abbotsford Rd. and Greene St.). You may remember that Don held the 2 meter distance record for many yeard — about 1200 miles. Of course this record has been eclipsed by the recent 2600 mile Hawaii record of another W6. However, there are some interesting things about Don's contacts.

He had a six driven elements (with 6 reflectors) vertically polarized antenna mounted on a 50' telephone pole — broadside type antenna. His contact was by phone and occured about 4 PM on a Sunday afternoon. He maintained the QSO with Dallas, Texas, for over an hour. During the contact he also heard a Biloxi, Mississippi, station calling CQ — and this would be a 1500 mile reach. He could not raise this station.

Later investigation indicated that at the time of the contact there was a severe electrical storm over Dallas at about 50,000 feet. This may have given some reflection characteristics.

"I visited five station, but nowhere did I see any evidence of "California Kilowatts" -- just normal outputs. It is fairly common to take a rig to a mountain top over a weekend and get a little DX.

Also sampled the famous smog but wasn't bothered by it in the least.
The area normally has quite a bit of just plain old fog and it is hard to -6-

tell the difference.

It's just nine hours flying time from Phila, and when the Jets go in service in August, you can get out there in five hours. But it's nice to live in Philadelphia, and I was glad to get back home.

FCC Spectrum Hearings to Affect Electronic Designers:

The allocation of spectrum space between 25 and 890 mc is under reexamination in Washington, and the findings will have an impact on designers throughout the electronics industry.

Months of testimony before the Federal Communications Commission will involve:

*Television--TV is now the largest area of spectrum and the most complex. Involved is uhf TV: 470-890 mc. The FCC has long tried, without success, to make uhf economically feasible on a broad scale. It is now considering other means of expansion beyond the 12 vhf channels.

*Industrial competition for uhf—AT&T has asked the FCC to establish a mobile telephone service using the 765-840 mc—the heart of uhf TV.
Mobile equipment manufacturers contend AT&T wants to monopolize the mobile service; they are urging the FCC to let AT&T experiment for five years but not to authorize service on a regular basis. The broadcasting industry, on the other hand, argues that uhf space must be retained until a better spectrum location is found for TV.

*Control of the spectrum—The FCC has jurisdiction over only part of the 25-890 mc band. Other government agencies, primarily the military, control a large portion, much of it for aircraft communications, navigation, etc. The FCC is negotiating with these services to find out if they will swap some of their whf spectrum for TV's uhf. This would give TV a more contiguous band. The shift in military equipment would cost billions.

*Congress, and its reactions—The Senate Commerce Committee has criticized the FCC for not expanding TV and providing more competing stations. The House Commerce Committee has voiced concern over the split management of the spectrum by the FCC and other services.

*The Electronic Industries Assn,-The EIA membership is responsible
for most of the nation's electronics
production. EIA is opposed to giving
AT&T too large a foothold in the
mobile field. It points to the
following expected growth in mobile

transmitter usage, and it wants its share: 695,000 transmitters in 1958; to 1,390,000 in 1963; to 2,650,000 in 1968; to 5,000,000 in 1978. EIA wants an additional 41 mc in the 25-890 mc region to take care of this growth.

It will be many months before the commission finally determines what arrangements are in order,

SSB, UHF Modulation was used in Lunar Voice Relays. Suppressed carrier, amplitude-limited, single sideband on UHF was used in the the recent moon-bounce of President Eisenhower's message. Single sideband was employed to overcome selective fading resulting from vibrations or motions of the moon; and limiting of amplitude, acheived by placing an RF limiter between SSB modulator and the transmitter, provided

Some statistics on the Presidential-bounce:

uniformly high average power.

Path loss on the order of 250 db; employment of a 50 kw nominal maximum power transmitter; a received signal on the order of 10⁻¹⁵ watt; transmission was made in the low UHF region between 300-500 mc; bandwidth was 200-2000 cycles; and message was received with an 18 db signal to noise ratio. (Ed. Do you mean 250 db, as written above, or 25 db? 250 doesn't sound right.)

A few weeks ago a spokesman for the State of California made the first specific recommendation that TV broadcasting be transferred from VHF to the UHF band.

He recommended that 50-88 mc be assigned land mobile and that the amateur band, now assigned 50-54 mc, be moved to 46-50 mc. He also recommended that 400-410 mc be assigned Government and meteorological operations and that 410-430 mc be allocated to hams. The space between 430-470 mc, he stated, should be assigned to land mobile. The above was one of the last of a group of proposals presented to the FCC.

A line of high temperature power tubes using vapor cooling technique has been put into production by AT&T. Anode dissipation under normal conditions is said to exceed 800 watts per square inch. The company claims these tubes dissipate much more heat than conventional air or water-cooled tubes, and can operate for much longer periods without servicing.

Cooling equipment consists of a boiler filled to a definite level with distilled water, and cooling coils immersed in water. The tube sets in the boiler and is sealed by its own weight.

Steam that developes is recondensed in the boiler by the transfer of heat to water in the cooling coils.

High altitude nuclear blasts modify the ionosphere and create electronic interference, disrupting radio communications. The disruptive effects on communications of two high-altitude nuclear explosions set off in the Pacigic Ocean near Johnston Island last year were made public by the government recently. The electronic interference caused by the explosions resulted from modifications of the ionosphere. Ionizing radiation from the detonations so disturbed the earth's upper atmosphere that some radio waves were absorbed or scattered.

MAILMAN'S NET

It seems that the Post Office Department is setting up an Emergency net for all Postmen in the U.S. who are hams.

Herm received an application to join it.

It seems that WSQCU and K \emptyset AGJ are heading it up.

Since most mailmen are finished their work early it means that quite a number will be home in the afternoon, and should an emergency occur they will be able to get on the air early.

This seems to be a suppliment to CD, and will be known as PON, or Post Office Net.

The net right now is in the stage of organization and until it is fully organized, it will not be on the air.

It proves one thing, that the Post Office Department recognizes the value of the ham in an emergency, for which we are grateful.

FROM ARRL C D BULLETIN

TECHS AND NOVICE MAY RECEIVE DES APPOINTMENT

ALL ARRL AFFILIATED RADIO CLUBS please take note that Technician and Novice Class FCC licensess may hold OES appointments as well as members holding higher classes of FCC license. The DES post is definitely oriented to the amateur who works some v.h.f., either SIX or TWO meter or above. His activity reports bearing on v.h.f. propagation conditions are possibly best known, as identified with OES work. But good equipment technique and operating skill are equally objectives of an DES, as explained in Operating an Amateur Radio Station. Less recognized has been the dedication of DES to developing successful communications systems * * * but it's in the book, and current Net Progress (in the v.h.f.'s) spells it out.

Such nets have been on the increase.
For example, in the last three years note the progressive statistics from ----cfficial-ARRL Wet-Registrations:

2 METERS: 48, 58 and 68 nets.

6 METERS: 21, 43, and this year 73 nets!

237 net sessions a week is a notable operation, and the average such net seems to be keeping two sessions per week, and this is likely to expand in the future. The v.h.f. net trend shows 2-meter net registrations up 41.7% and 6-meter net activity up 246% in just two seasons!

ON CLARIFYING DES OBJECTIVES

That less-stressed DES objective (practical amateur communication results in the v.h.f.'s) will be given amplification shortly -- both in QST and in the Operating Booklet. We hope all who get this bulletin will help tell more Techs, and Novices about this. DES are the logical supportors and originators of v.h.f.-met operations. We think this appointment, like others, should more clearly stress the identity with general communications service as well as Public Service. Nets and scheduled gork and right handling of traffic, when there is some, is important and our identity with it. Such OES emphasis is not only for the greater credit of DES but for Amateur Radio.

To this end then note the following section which is currently becoming part of the official appointment (OES) description:

"To earn or maintain appointment, DES may also exemplify and demonstrate the capabilities of V.H.F. section nets for rendering communications service to the puvlic and amateur radio. When handling traffic standard ARRL procedure and message form will be followed and contacts maintained for liaison with NTS to assist in the overall nationally-integrated traffic system, as feasible."

C L U B S and P A Ms, please tell all your members and general amateur groups of this emphasis in DES, the stress placed on practical work, and wish of ARRL to invite all actives on—the—air who are eligible to find out more about the DES post, and getting appointment from the SCM —— address per page 6 QST.
